ANTI-RACISM PLEDGE

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Beeches Junior School Anti-Racism Pledge



Why do we have an anti-racism pledge? And why now?

The murder of George Floyd was a significant moment. It prompted worldwide reflection that was long overdue and Beeches Junior School was no exception. We know that we have a kind and caring community and our children are our pride and joy. But we also recognise our important role in helping to shape the society and the attitudes of the future, and we recognise that all of us can learn and do better in the fight against racism. It is not sufficient to be "non-racist"; "anti-racism" means taking an active role in the fight against racism, and that is what we strive to do.

We are a proudly multi-cultural school and it is incumbent on us to provide a safe, comfortable environment where all children and adults can feel comfortable and can express their views and let their personalities shine through; where they can set their aspirations high and be supported to fulfil their dreams; where the colour of their skin and their ethnic and cultural background are no barrier to achievement or happiness.

The UN Charter on the Rights of the Child states:

Article 2 - All children have all these rights, no matter who they are, where they live, what language they speak, what their religion is, what they think, what they look like, if they are a boy or girl, if they have a disability, if they are rich or poor, and no matter who their parents or families are or what their parents or families believe or do. No child should be treated unfairly for any reason.


Article 12 - Children have the right to give their opinions freely on issues that affect them. Adults should listen and take children seriously

Article 29 - Children's education should help them fully develop their personalities, talents and abilities. It should teach them to understand their own rights, and to respect other people's rights, cultures and differences. It should help them to live peacefully and protect the environment.

Article 30 - Children have the right to **use their own language, culture and religion** - even if these are not shared by most people in the country where they live.

At Beeches Junior School, we pledge to:

- Listen to all members of our school community, particularly those who have experienced racism; recognise the reality of racism and the harm it causes, reflect on what we hear and make changes where necessary.
- Educate our staff, governors and children, encouraging open discussion, creating a safe environment where everyone can question, debate and explore issues around racism.
- Represent a wide range of ethnic groups and cultures through our curriculum, the resources we use and the people that come to our school.
- Stand up and speak out where racism occurs and follow up incidents rigorously and fairly.
- Celebrate the achievements, successes and positive contributions to UK and world history of people from a wide range of ethnic and cultural backgrounds, including those of our children at school.
