Use the pictures to



Sound out/blend help me. words I don't know



Look for smaller words inside words.



Break words down into syllables.



Use punctuation to make sense of what I am reading.



Go back and read a word or sentence again if I don't understand it.



Read on to see if I can work out the meaning of a word I don't know



reading to see if it makes sense.



Spot when I've made a mistake and go back to try and put it right.



Ask questions to help with my reading if I don't understand.



Talk through my ideas. thoughts and feelings about what I'm reading



Use words I can see around me or that I have read before
